

As neighbors depart Washington Square and new families arrive, we want to reach out and welcome our new residents.


We are known for our sense of neighborhood so please offer your new neighbors a smile, a handshake and you may make a new friend.

Neighborhood Spotlight: Alan Anderson Award goes to...

The Alan Anderson Award is presented to residents of a selected Washington Square home that exemplifies Alan's love, pride and care for his home and neighborhood which contributes to Washington Square's sense of community and positivity.

Congratulations to Washington Square's long time residents, the van der Roest family. The front of their home for the last eight years has undergone a

major facelift. It all started when they realized they needed a ramp for Susan's walker and wheelchair and a small porch for lounging, plus they wanted it to be attractive and in character with their home which was built in 1939.

The van der Roest Family has deep roots in Santa Ana. Martin and Susan lived on Freeman Street in Washington Square for many years prior to moving into the house on Towner which they purchased from Susan's brother, Dan Grisct, former Mayor of Santa Ana.

Before occupying the house, they did a major interior restoration keeping in mind their aesthetic objective when designing. Susan describes the look they are going for: "We want this house to look like a well-maintained 1939 home." With that in mind they started their newest renovation adventure.

An interesting hardscape feature of the property is the scalloped white fence which is made of concrete. Concrete was not an uncommon fencing material when the house was constructed in 1939, but fell out of favor over time so the fence repair project was a challenge. The van der Roests were fortunate to find skilled artisans who were able to restore it onsite, workers recast and completely replaced damaged areas for a like-new look.

Susan and Martin's hardscape adventure continued with the decorative flagstone which now wraps the house, new porch and new ramp. The intention was to match the original stonework in the backyard (not pictured) in both color and pattern. Both became a challenge. A few loads of off-color stone were returned before the project was completed. To create the pattern, every stone of the complicated, deconstructed pattern was laid on the ground before placing stones permanently on the wall, it came out as envisioned. The van der Roests are thrilled with the result, especially Susie who absolutely loves her new ramp.

The design objective of creating "a well-maintained 1939 home" drove the selection and placement of the new plantings. Carefully selected roses, shrubs, grasses and groundcover all came from Roger's Gardens in Corona del Mar. An accomplished gardener, Susie personally arranged, and rearranged, the plants before they were put in the ground and has kept detailed records so she can chart her successes and (hopefully not) failures. Let's say "challenges" instead

The 2012 Great Backyard Birdcount

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) February 17-20

We can help scientists at Cornell University and The Audubon Society.

We're Washington Square and we love our birds so this newsletter the featured bird is...ALL OF THEM! So let's have some fun and maybe learn a little something about our avian cohabitators.

Washington Square can help both scientists and the birds by simply observing, counting, then writing down what we see.

Further in the newsletter you will find more information, birds to watch for and links to the program to download the count sheets.

It's as easy as 1-2-3!

1. Plan to count birds for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the count. You can count for longer than that if you wish! Count birds in as many places and on as many days as you like—one day, two days, or all four days. Submit a separate checklist for each new day. You can also submit more than one checklist per day if you count in other locations on that day.

2. Count the greatest number of individuals of each species that you see together at any one time. You may find it helpful to print out your regional bird checklist to get an idea of the kinds of birds you're likely to see in your area in February. You could take note of the highest number of each species you see on this checklist.

3. Enter your results through the web page when you're finished. You'll see a button marked "Enter Your Checklists!" on the website home page beginning on the first day of the count. It will remain active until the deadline for data submission.

Special Note: As the Great Backyard Bird Count has grown, more and more bird clubs, nature centers, and local parks are conducting special bird walks or hikes during the GBBC and having participants enter their tallies afterward. You may want to join one.

Definitions:

Stationary Count: This is a count made in one area, such as your backyard, where you remain in one place. In this case, simply report the highest number of each species seen together at one time.

Traveling Count: This is a count made over a distance, such as birding on a trail. In this case you will count new birds of each species as you move along, but only if you can be relatively certain you did not count them previously. You'll add the numbers for each species you have observed at the end of your walk.

How To Participate: The Great Backyard Bird Count Nuts and Bolts

Because the results provide a snapshot of the whereabouts of more than 600 bird species It's important that you enter what you count. Simply enter your results at www.birdcount.org, where you can watch as the tallies grow across the continent. (The four-day count typically records more than 11 million observations.)

We highly recommend you watch this very informative short video at <http://www.birdsource.org/gbbc/GBBCvideo12>.

What you need:

Binoculars, "Western Feeder Birds" printout, "Regional Bird Checklist" printout, clipboard, pencil

1. **Binoculars.** A little magnification can go a long way to identifying a bird species. *We highly recommend binoculars*
2. **"Western Feeder Birds" printout.** Let's face it, we're in a neighborhood (not marshes, mountains or shore) so we'll be seeing mostly what are called "Common Feeder Birds". Download and print the handy two-pages of photos of "Western Feeder Birds" at <http://www.birds.cornell.edu/pfw/CommonFeederBirds--West.pdf>
3. **Regional Bird Checklist** from GBBC to help record what you see. Print it out here: <http://gbbc.birdsource.org/gbbcApps/checklist>. It's overkill but you won't miss anything--like our Parrots which do not appear on your "Common Feeder Birds" list but they are certainly common around here.
4. **Clipboard, Pencil** These are optional, but they will make it easy to make notes in the "field"
5. **Data Entry Form (optional)** You can enter your data here and then copy it online at birdcount.org



To enter your results

Couldn't be easier. Online at www.birdcount.org, you will find an interactive entry form. You need to enter separately for each day you participate.

Why count the birds?

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is a joint partnership between Audubon and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, with Bird Studies Canada as its official Canadian partner. The GBBC is open to birders of all ages and abilities, and helps provide researchers with citizen science data on where birds are each February.

"When thousands of people all tell us what they're seeing, we can detect patterns in how birds are faring from year to year," said Janis Dickinson, director of Citizen Science at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

Says Audubon Chief Scientist, Gary Langham. "Like Audubon's Christmas Bird Count, volunteers help us with data year after year, providing scientific support that is the envy of many institutions. It's also a lot of fun."


The ones to watch for

If you're a bird hobbyist, nature student, or merely mildly interested, Here are a few common neighborhood birds you may run into.

Parrots Hard to miss these special birds. They are the plentiful green noisemakers when they're perched high in the trees, on a line, or settling down for the night. Because they stick to treetops, without binoculars, it might be tricky to discern their markings.

But help is on the way. Go to amazornia.com/report-sightings where you will find photos to help you tell them apart. In fact, amazornia.com is all about the California parrots and a highly recommended source.

Most parrot species, in their natural habitats elsewhere, are gravely endangered due to the pet trade, habitat loss and other variables. The naturalization of parrots here in California shows there is hope that these incredible birds can survive among us. It is with this hope for the future that we ask you to never disturb, disrupt, harass or attempt to capture these free-flying parrots. Parrots mate for life and have deep emotional ties to their flock members. They would suffer greatly if not left to do what parrots do.



Hummingbirds They may be small, but they're easy to see even if you just glimpse a flash of their rapid movement as they dart through the air. Station yourself by a hummingbird feeder or some orange or red flowers, and you're sure to see them. Probably the Anna's or Rufous varieties will show themselves in Washington Square.

Mourning Doves With their distinctive call, coloring and body shape, you're bound to spot a few. These are gentle birds that get along well with other birds so you may spot other species with them. Look on the ground for feeding birds as they prefer to eat on the ground finding soft grass seeds. From a feeder, their preferred diet is millet and ground corn but did you know that they eat vast amounts of weed seeds, making them very valuable in keeping down excess vegetation around our yards? Because their bill isn't designed to crack open large shells, they prefer the softer seeds of weeds and grasses. But they can still eat hard-shelled seeds which they swallow whole and grind up in their gizzards.



Finches House Finches are also plentiful in Washington Square. They are small-bodied finches with fairly large beaks and somewhat long, flat heads. The wings are short, making the tail seem long by comparison. Adult males are rosy red around the face and upper breast, with streaky brown back, belly and tail. In Adult females aren't red; they are plain grayish-brown with thick, blurry streaks and an indistinctly marked face,

Sparrows House Sparrows and Song Sparrows are likely to be what you identify in Washington Square and they can be easily confused with Tree Sparrows by the inexperienced. Song Sparrows are streaky and brown with thick streaks on a white chest and flanks. On a closer look, the head is an attractive mix of warm red-brown and slaty gray, though these shades, as well as the amount of streaking, vary extensively across North America.

Western Scrub Jays If you see a larger blue bird in Washington Square, the odds are like a zillion to one you're looking at a Western Scrub Jay. A bold and familiar jay of the American West, the Scrub-Jay is common throughout much of the western lowlands, aka Washington Square, because it has adapted well to suburbs and comes readily to bird feeders.

Crows Another easy bird to identify. Just look up into the trees lining our streets and you have a good chance of seeing one or more. Social and highly intelligent, birds, they travel in groups and the sexes differ little in appearance. Did you know it's not unusual for a crow to live for 20 years?

Are there drugs in the food!? I'm addicted to everything that I've tried, and I want to keep trying more. The Playground is definitely a hidden treasure in DTSA, away from the hustle and hype of Chapter One & The Crosby (although they're still delicious). The Playground is just on another level. I went here for dinner twice in one week. Once with 4 guys (my roommates) on a Friday night and once with my boyfriend Marc on a Wednesday night.

Visit 1: We made reservations 30 minutes before our reservation and we were quickly seated. 3 of us ordered the Playground Burger while the other guys opted for the TK Style Fried Chicken and Wagyu Steak (medium rare). EVERYTHING IS AWESOME.

Visit 2: Marc and I didn't make reservations because I foolishly thought that there wouldn't be a crowd on Wednesday night. It was packed. We were lucky and found 2 seats at the bar after we were told that the wait would be 30 minutes (which isn't bad). Got to start our meal earlier than we thought!

*The Playground Burger- NOT overhyped because I've had my fair share of burgers with my bf and The Playground ties for #1 with Father's Office IMO. Lucky for me, The Playground is ridiculously close to where I live and it's pretty much amazing. The bun doesn't look huge, but the course-chopped patty is pretty hefty. Cooked medium rare, just the way I like it, the meat IS the burger. WOW. Crazy delicious! The combination of the sauce, cheese, lettuce, and bun make this burger scrumptious!!

*TK (Thomas Keller) Style Fried Chicken was so juicy, tender, and flavorful. The meat inside of the fried goodness we call chicken skin was incredibly tasty. You get 3 big pieces and it's well worth your money. Addicted.

*Wagyu Steak- It's like meat butter, ya'll. Super tender, but juicy, hearty steak. I've had the best of the best wagyu in NYC, and this is the closest you'll get to fine dining quality steak (from my experience). So simple, but so satisfying. Wow.

*Brussels Sprouts- WHAT?! It doesn't even taste like veggies anymore! The sprouts were infused with an mouthwatering, smokey flavor and the bitterness of the vegetable was obsolete. The bits of thick-cut bacon were like hidden treasures and the fingerling potatoes made the dish hearty and filling. Love that it's cooked in a cast iron skillet.

*Fries- The fries are cooked perfectly crisp and there's just enough salt on them. The aioli is money though!!!! I love fries, but I crave these ones.

*Anniversary cake- Appropriately named for the occasion that Marc and I were celebrating. The bartender and a server said that it was best thing they've eaten, so we had to get it and I'm happy we did! Insanely rich, but not overwhelming chocolate with a hint of almond flavor. It was delicious and a great ending to our meal.

You know you'd better put a restaurant in the newsletter when you're at a Board meeting, ask for suggestions for the newsletter and everyone starts singing the praises of this place called The Playground that just opened Downtown. Trust me, that has never happened before!

So we did some research and this place sounds amazing. The brainchild of Chef Jason Quinn, one of the three Chefs on the Lime Truck which won season two of The Great Food Truck Race on Food Channel.

To avoid rewriting the wheel, I thought I'd go to Yelp and pick up some comments. The newest review turned out to be AWESOME....like the Playground. So here it is:

For drinks, get the beers on tap. The bartender said that they basically pick and choose what brews to highlight because it's difficult to supply as a new establishment. He has stuff from Marc's favorite SoCal brewery (Stone Brewery), so that was an automatic plus for us. If you're DD, the fresh ginger ale is SUPER refreshing. Love it. Love this place.

Burglaries are up. Be smart!

Here's advice from those who know.

I investigate burglaries and recently there was a burglary in Washington Square. There have also been a few residential burglaries in nearby neighborhoods namely Floral Park. For further information you can visit www.crimemapping.com, enter your address and it will show you all the crimes in Washington Square and beyond. You can zoom in for more detail.

The current economic climate likely plays a role in this increase of property related crimes. Additionally January is immediately post holiday gift-giving which means many homes have new items that are attractive to thieves.

Most burglaries occur during the day between 9:00 am and 5:00 pm while residents are away from their homes. Most of the time burglars will case or drive/walk around the neighborhood before making their selection of a victim residence. Suspects will often knock on the door of the home to see if someone is home prior to breaking in. If the door is answered they will often state they were looking for a friend, have the wrong address or give some other excuse.

Often they are *carrying a backpack or some type of bag* and *more than one suspect* involved. If you have any similar activity in your neighborhood please contact the Santa Ana Police Department Dispatch Desk at 714-245-8665 and give a description of the suspect including clothing, the suspect's vehicle (color, model, license #) or bicycle as well as their last direction of travel.

Next are some safeguards to help you prevent burglaries.

SAFEGUARDS

There is no such thing as a perfect security system or locking device but, there are ways to deter a thief. Remember, they want to get in and get out of a home *quickly*. Anything that prevents them from doing so is a deterrent, as they do not want to draw attention to themselves. Thieves rely on blending in with a neighborhood or leading others to believe they are something else (eg. exercising, soliciting, disguised as a worker).

So basically, thieves are opportunists looking for easy targets. Open/unlocked windows and doors, open garages, and items left out for the taking are prime targets. Even if a home is locked; keep valuable items out of sight (laptops, jewelry, purses, etc.) and, at a minimum, pull the drapes/blinds closed when not at home. A thief is less likely to break into a home that doesn't ensure a reward for their efforts.

The fastest way to enter a locked residence is to smash/pry a window or kick in a door. Windows that have multiple locks, shatterproof glass or doors with hidden security measures (eg. motion detection lights or alarms) are unexpected and unwelcome delays that draw attention to the suspect and often result in an aborted burglary.

The best safeguards are to take preventative measures, be alert, and report suspicious activity if observed. You know if something doesn't look right or if a vehicle or person does not belong. These are things to take note of and report. Report it when you see it! We depend on YOU.

Choosing A Professional Tax Preparer:

Beware of any tax preparer who...

- Refuses to sign your tax return
- Refuses to give you a copy of your tax return
- Charges based on a % of the refund
- Promises a refund
- Asks you to sign a blank tax form to be filled in later
- Does not have a written privacy policy
- Claims to be a CRTP, but will not show proof of a current bond
- Claims to be a CRTP, but his/her name is not listed on the CTEC website

Every preparer who signs a federal tax return for a fee must be registered with CTEC and have a number. You can verify the status of a CRTP at www.ctec.org by clicking on "Verify."

A lighthearted look at bees



DID YOU KNOW?

It is illegal to dispose of hazardous waste in personal or public trash cans and it is punishable by a \$25,000 fine. This includes motor oil, housepaint and other toxic substances.

Trash containers are not to be put out on Sunday before 4:00 PM and must be taken in by 12:00 midnight Monday evening. Trash containers must be stored so they are not visible from the street.

- **Garage/Yard Sales** are only allowed on the first weekend of March, June, September, and December, Saturday and Sunday only. Items must not be put out before 7:00 AM and taken in by 4:00 PM. No new merchandise is allowed to be sold.

- **Cars** are never to be parked on the lawn. Inoperable vehicles are not allowed on the street or in driveways and cars cannot remain in the street for more than 72 hours without being moved. Inoperable vehicles are vehicles that are damaged, have flat tires, and/or do not run.

- **Front yard fences** require a building permit and can not be over 30" high. The permits are free. Contact the building department 667-2700 for more information. Maintain your wood fences by keeping them painted and in good repair.

- **Store Shopping Carts** are a blight when left on the street after they are stolen from stores. The solution? If this applies to you, please use your own folding shopping cart instead of stealing them from stores to transport your purchases. It is costly for the city to pick them up and comes out of our pockets.

Planning a fence? Did you know you need a permit to erect a fence around your property to control height and material requirements. Permits are free.
